Last of Spanish War Vets Retires from 24th Infantry

FORT BENNING, Ga.— The last remaining member of the 24th U.S. Infantry, who fought in Cuba with Teddy Roosevelt, severed his connection with the unit March 31.

First Sergeant William McCauley, 67, was retired after more than thirty years of wearing the uniform of the United States Army.

McCauley is a native of Spottsylvania, Va. His service in the army began in 1896, and includes, in addition to participation in the battle of San Juan Hill, active service against renegade Indians in Montana, who were fleeing from Canadian justice after the Riel Rebellion in Manitoba; active service under 1st Lieutenant John J. Pershing in Troop F of the 10th Cavalry on the Island of Samar during the Philippine insurrection, and troop training during the World War.

The old Indian-fighter and veteran of tropic wars is almost sixty years of age, but still hale and hearty, and, to use his own words, "not lazy enough to make a good rifle shot, 'cause I like to lie down."
